AAC Clyde Space

Delays weigh on Q4, but fundamentals intact – Q4 review

The report was mixed, in our view: revenue and the Data & Services EBITDA margin came in below our expectations, while Products & Missions costs and overall group expenses were below our estimates. The revenue shortfall is explained by delays from third-party participants in a project, i.e. no sales are lost, only postponed. As nothing in the report materially changes our view on the investment case, we maintain our fair value range of SEK107–138 per share.

2025 in review. 2025 did not develop as the company had hoped. On the positive side, the Data & Services segment grew by 78.5%, of which at least SEK19.4m is attributable to the acquisition of Spacemetric in late 2024. The underperformance instead stems from the Products & Missions segment, where project delays affected deliveries. As these are postponed rather than cancelled, we expect them to support progression in 2026. Despite unsatisfactory sales growth, AAC still reported positive EBITDA for the year.

Launch of VIREON 1 & 2. The first two satellites in the VIREON constellation are now being shipped for launch on SpaceX's Transporter-16 mission, with launch planned no earlier than 29 March. At the same time, AAC has initiated procurement of components for VIREON 3 & 4, which will enable the constellation to provide sufficient coverage and revisit rates. As the number of satellites, data volumes, and customers increase, AAC must scale the segment's workforce accordingly, which is the key reason why the Data & Services EBITDA margin was lower than we had anticipated.

Fair value unchanged. We leave our fair value range unchanged, as we are not making any significant estimate revisions and the report does not challenge our investment view. Our range corresponds to 2026e EV/Sales multiples of 2.3–3.0x and EV/EBITDA of 14.4–18.8x, placing the valuation around the midpoint of the peer groups we use.

**Near term:
within 12M**

In Q4 2025, AAC Clyde Space (AAC) launched two new satellites, with additional launches planned for 2026 to further strengthen its Data & Services offering. The company has also opened a dedicated sales office in London to support this segment’s commercial expansion. We expect these initiatives to drive continued growth and consider them key to securing a strong return on investment. Within the Products & Missions segment, we find AAC positioned for new orders, including potential participation in EUMETSAT’s EPS-Sterna project, to which AAC will supply advanced weather sensors and critical components such as its flagship products STARBUCK and SIRIUS.

**Long-term
outlook: 5Y+**

The strategic decision to strengthen the space data segment positions AAC for scalable revenue growth and margin expansion. As this strategy requires significant investment in new satellites, it is crucial that expansion aligns with revenue growth to ensure a solid return on investment. The transformation is supported by the Products & Missions segment, which supplies satellites at a lower cost than external providers, thereby improving the economics. If executed successfully, this strategy has the potential to deliver strong margins and healthy cash flow. We also view positively AAC’s co-funded development of a service platform providing actionable insights for the forestry sector. For the Products & Missions segment, increased participation in large-scale projects remains important to drive higher revenues and maintain stable, sustainable margins.

Company description

AAC Clyde Space is a space technology company operating through two segments: Data & Services and Products & Missions. The company is increasing its focus on expanding its Data & Services business, where it operates its own satellite constellations to generate proprietary data for applications in land management, such as forestry and agriculture, and maritime intelligence, including vessel monitoring. This data is sold to a diverse customer base comprising government agencies, coastguards, and financial institutions, among others. The Products & Missions segment represents AAC’s heritage, developing and manufacturing critical satellite components, including computers, sensors, and power control systems, as well as complete small LEO satellites, and there by supports the expansion of the Data & Services segment.

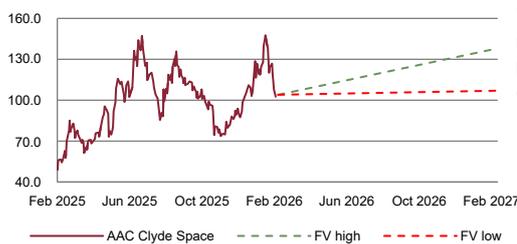

Valuation and methodology

Our valuation is based on a scenario analysis combined with a sum-of-the-parts (SOTP) approach. The scenario analysis outlines three cases that primarily differ in how quickly AAC succeeds in scaling its Data & Services business. In the SOTP, we benchmark AAC’s two segments against comparable international peers to reflect their distinct business models. We consider usage of international peers appropriate given the global nature of the space industry and AAC’s operational presence in Europe, US, and South Africa. Based on our estimates and applying peer-aligned valuation multiples, we arrive at our fair value range.

Fair value range 12M



The upper end of our fair value range assumes AAC achieves a 2026e EV/S multiple in line with the peer group median, supported by the progression outlined in our estimates. The lower end reflects a 2026e EV/S multiple below peers, illustrating a scenario where AAC’s sales growth falls shy of expectations, resulting in a lower valuation multiple.

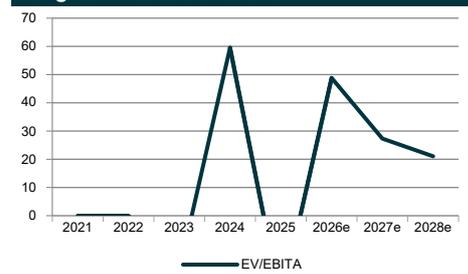

P/E 12-months forward



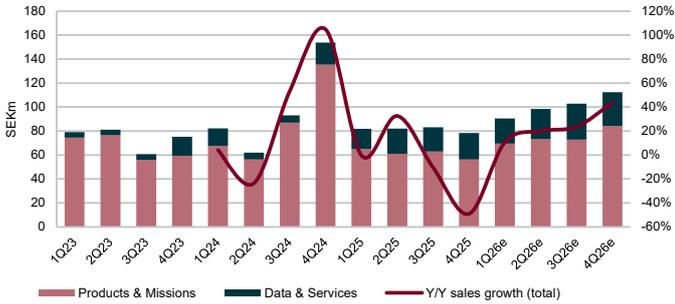
Long-term valuation trend

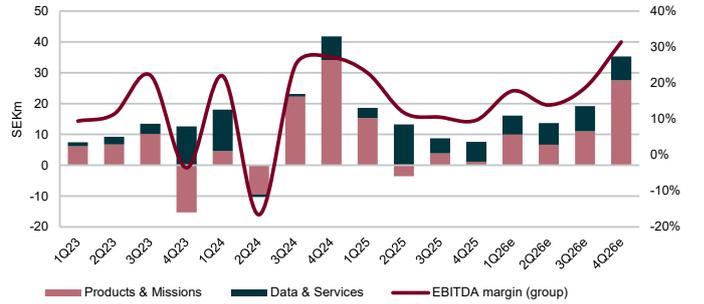

Sales per segment



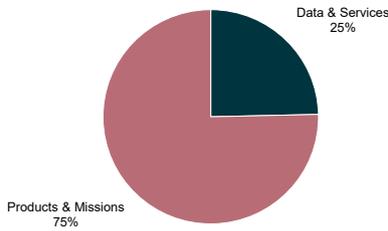

EBITDA per segment



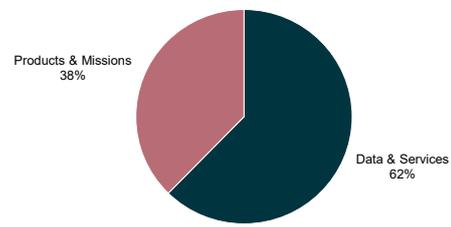

Data & Services constituted 25% of sales in 2025



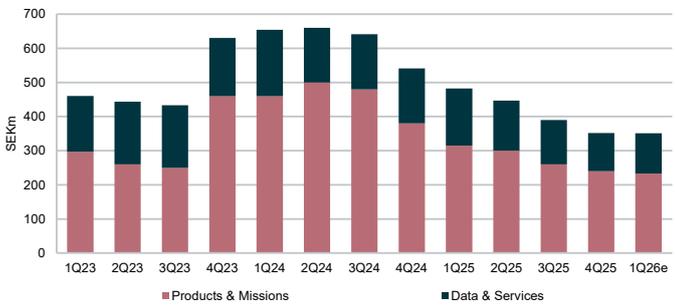

Data & Services constituted 62% of EBITDA in 2025



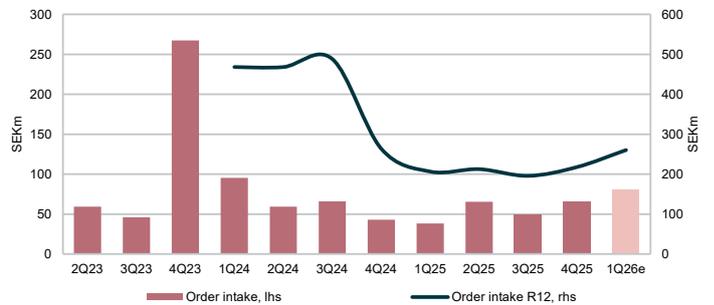

Order backlog per segment



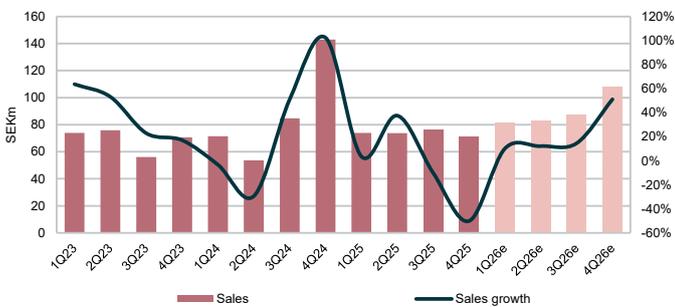

Order intake is highly dependent on whether large orders are won



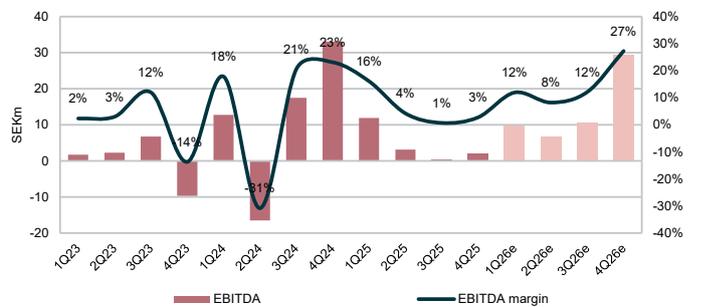

Group sales by quarter



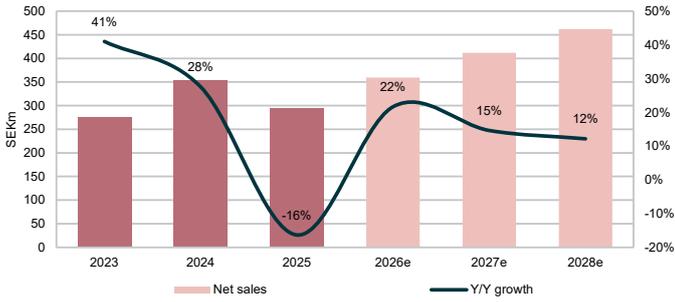

Group EBITDA by quarter



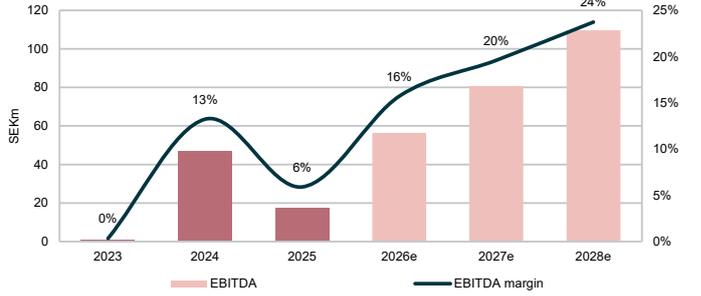

Group net sales development



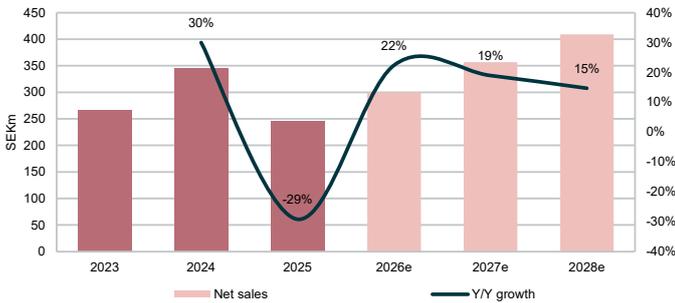

Group EBITDA development



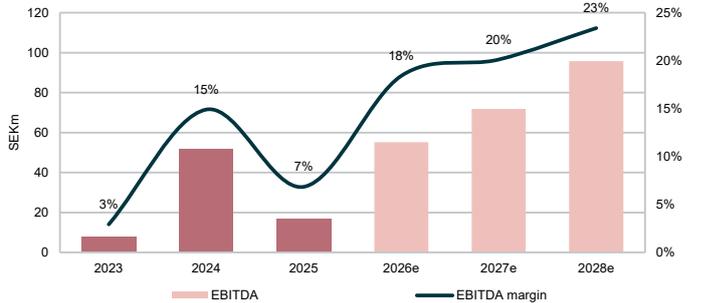

Products & Missions net sales development



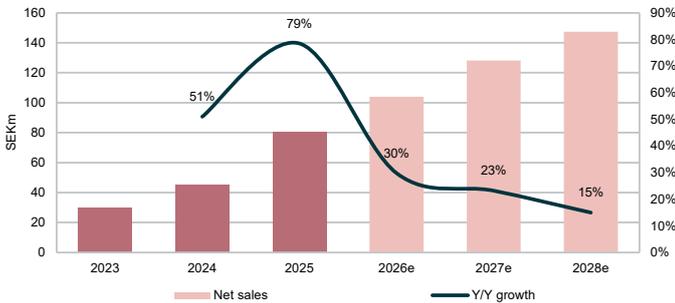

Products & Missions EBITDA development



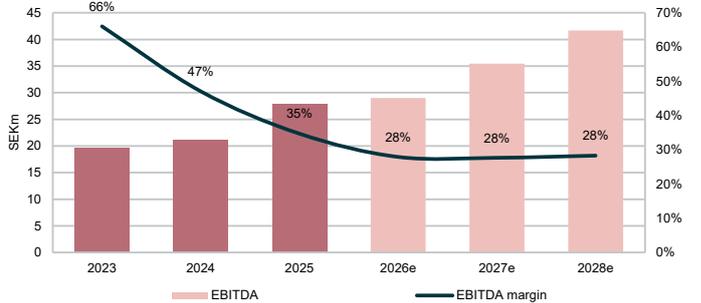

Data & Services net sales development



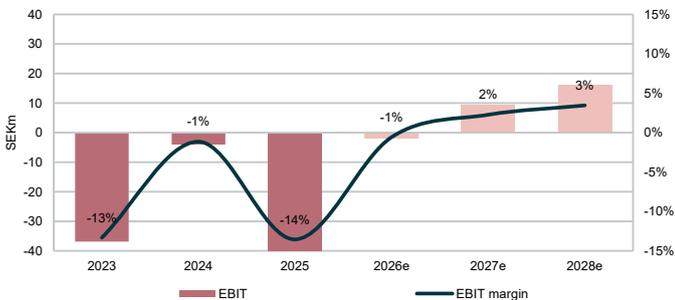

Data & Services EBITDA development



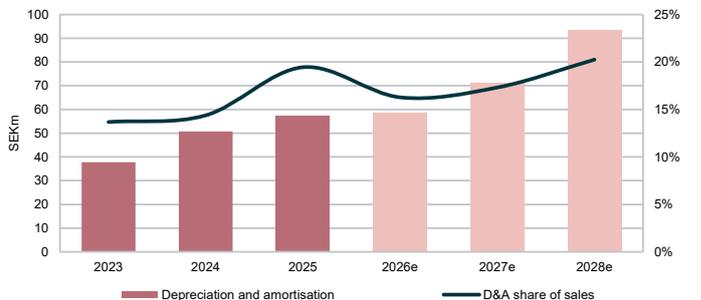

Estimates and estimate changes

The Q4 revenue was disappointing and came in well below our estimates and the guidance published by the company in November 2025. The shortfall was entirely attributable to the Products & Missions segment, where management cites delays from third-party participants in a project.

We were also surprised by the weak EBITDA margin in the Data & Services segment. However, this is explained by AAC increasing sales and operation people within the segment as it is about to launch several new satellites in the next years. As overall group opex declined and Products & Missions still reported a positive EBITDA despite significantly lower sales, this suggests that AAC is reallocating costs from Products & Missions to Data & Services. We view the lower cost base in Products & Missions as highly positive, particularly as we expect improved deliveries in 2026, which should support a higher EBITDA margin for the segment.

Valuation

We benchmark AAC against international satellite operators and technology suppliers, as AAC operates across both areas. We therefore find it appropriate to apply a sum-of-the-parts (SOTP) valuation approach. Given that AAC is in the middle of its strategic transformation, with increased focus on the Data & Services segment, we consider it relevant to model different growth scenarios. We present three scenarios that differ primarily in the pace at which AAC succeeds in expanding its Data & Services business. The outcome of these scenarios results in a fair value of SEK107–138 per share, corresponding to a 2026e EV/S of 2.3–2.9x and EV/EBITDA of 14.4–18.8x. As several satellite operator peers are not expected to be EBIT positive in 2026e, according to FactSet estimates, we consider this valuation range reasonable at present.

Base-case scenario

Our base-case scenario is built on our current estimates for each segment. For the Data & Services segment, we apply a 2026e EV/S of 3.0–4.2x, corresponding to a fair value range of SEK40–56 per share. We select this range as the upper value aligns with the peer group median. For the Products & Missions segment, we apply a 2026e EV/S of 2.0–2.5x. Combining the two segments and adjusting for group eliminations results in a fair value range of SEK107–138 per share, equivalent to a 2026e EV/EBITDA of 14.4–18.8x. We find this fair, given that AAC is not yet consistently profitable on a net profit level.

Low-growth scenario

The low-growth scenario reflects a situation where AAC struggles to attract new customers to its Data & Services segment and does not secure major new contracts in Products & Missions. Hence, we assume lower sales growth in 2026e and a weaker drop-through to profitability, leading to a reduced EBITDA margin. Given the slower growth and weaker margins, we apply lower valuation multiples, resulting in a fair value range of SEK72–99 per share.

High-growth scenario

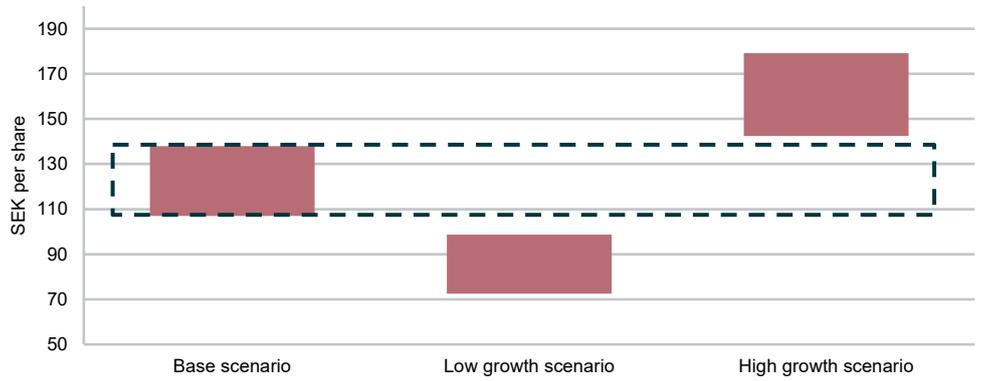
In the high-growth scenario, we assume that the new satellites to be launched in 2026 successfully attract additional customers and revenue streams, while the Products & Missions segment secures new large contracts that strengthen the order book and drive higher sales and margins than in our base case. As a result, we apply higher valuation multiples, which generates a fair value range of SEK142–179 per share.
